EXTRACTS FROM THE SPEECH BY THE MINSTER OF FISHERIES, MRS. GLADYS ASMAH (MP)

For sometime now the Guinea Current Large Marine Ecosystem Project activities have been given a lot of prominence in the media, both electronic and print. Personally, I have for a long time been concerned about the Transboundary problems that this project seeks to address. The Guinea Current Large Marine Ecosystem project, I understand, is a Regional project aimed at combating living resources depletion and coastal degradation the Guinea Current Large Marine Ecosystem through ecosystem through ecosystem-based regional actions. When we talk about the depletion of living resources in our ocean, we cannot leave out fish, which is a major living resource of the ocean.rresponsible fishing practices has not

only resulted in destruction of fishery resources but also resulted in conflict among the different sectors of the fishing industry. The government of the Republic of Ghana attaches so much importance to the fishery sector, because it is a great source of protein for our people, provides the livelihood for the coastal population and source of foreign exchange earner to the country. In spite of its economic importance, the fisheries sector is also faced with numerous problems.

It is in recognition of this that His Excellency the President decided to establish a Ministry at the highest level of government to give added impetus to this area of our national life. I say this because fishing is not only an economic activity but also a way of life for a number of communities in the country. And therefore if we want to reduce poverty in the country the Fisheries Sector must be given the attention it rightly deserves.

The GCLME project, I believe, is going to do exactly this. To do this the experts will have to undertake Fishery Resources Surveys, which will provide the relevant information to sustainable exploitation of fishery stocks. Apart from accurate data for planning and policy formulation, we have to turn attention to the creation of a core of indigenous scientist and highly skilled technical personnel, in other words we must do what ever it takes to indigenize our capacity for development of the industry.

At this juncture, it is now my singular honor and privilege to declare this Workshop on Fishery Resources Survey, Planning and Methodologies duly open. I wish you fruitful deliberations.
