⁵ The globally significant biodiversity area includes biodiversity conservation areas, biospheres, Ramsar sites, and protected areas in both Togo and Benin. This includes (Lac Boko- Zowla-Lac Togo): 120000 ha, Mono river sub-catchment: 60603 ha, Rivière Zio: 80000 ha, sub-basin Haho: 73600 ha, sub-basin Lili 51044, sub-basin Yoto: 30011, Ramsar site 1017: 142, 497 ha and Chenal de Gbaga 8000 ha.

⁶ The project will contribute to "improved management of landscapes and seascapes" with focus on improving sedimentation issues on the coastal Togo and Benin. The project will intervene in 3 sub-catchments that flow into Chenal de Gbaga in Togo, and Bouche du Roy and Chenal de Gbaga catchment in Benin. In these areas SLM practices such as agroforestry, alternative livelihood activities, and soil management tecniques will be implemented in the buffer zones of the significant biodiversity areas. The project estimates the direct SLM coverage to be 400,000 ha, and as project implements the alternative livelihood activities the area of coverage could expand based on selection of some final sites.
