6. Summary of Overall Project Progress:

FFA and SPC report that staff recruitment and administrative arrangements for the project were finalized and that project activities are now in full implementation phase.

The roll out of outputs and activities across the

IUCN have indicated that project implementation on IUCN-led activities is slower than originally expected but still on target to meet objectives. The primary reason for the delays in project implementation are that delays in the re-fitting of the research vessel due to hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico in late 2005 have meant two postponements in the dates for the seamount cruises. Current plan is for the cruises to take place from January – April 2007, but this can only be confirmed once the vessel re-fit is complete and it has been tested on the water. The vessel is expected to be ready for testing in early June 2006; once the seaworthiness is confirmed, exact dates for the cruises will be set, and project resources will start being expended at increased rates.

8. Challenges/Issues Encountered

FFA and Project Coordination

Component two activities are being implemented at a steady rate, particularly those relating to Legal and policy reforms. The FFA has restructured recently with a number of newly recruited staff in the MSC division. This however, has not impacted overly on the delivery of activities on this sub-component.

The administrative arrangements for the project are, on the whole established. The establishment of the project webpage was slower than anticipated but is now fully operation. Some confusion remains over channels of communication with the UNDP appointed country office and consideration is being given to improving communications between the PCU and UNDP.

IUCN

1. The recruitment of an activity coordinator in Fiji to handle on-the-ground planning and coordination for the IUCN-led seamount cruises has been delayed for two reasons: i) the cruise itself has been delayed; and ii) we had hoped to have the new IUCN Oceania Regional Office up and running before recruiting. This has meant that coordination is being done from IUCN HQ in Switzerland.

2. We do not have a budget line for travel under the first Component, even though we are doing quite a bit of traveling in this planning stage. This is primarily due to a previous misunderstanding on our part that the IUCN-led activities would be split across two components and an underestimation of the amount and cost of travel required.

9. Solutions Applied (to address issues and challenges)

Overall the progress of implementing project activities is satisfactory. Communications between FFA and the co-executing agencies SPC and IUCN are good. Discussions with UNDP-Honiara have taken place to clarify a number of administrative and financial uncertainties.

6. Summary of Overall Project Progress:

The overall progress of the project for this quarter has matured significantly. The project completes nine months of operation and project administration continues to make gains in the transition to being well established. Communication between the Implementing Agency and the Project Coordination Unit at FFA continues to develop and improve with consultation. Although, the confusion over the advance request submissions has resulted in Executing Agencies being overdrawn on two occasions.

Project presentations were given at the SPC Heads of Fisheries meeting in April and the Forum Fisheries Committee meeting in May.

Efforts to focus on national level activities under the project are being progressed as are continued efforts to secure co-funding for a number of project activities, including tagging and trophic structure investigations. Good progress in particular has been made in securing co-funding for tagging, including the following confirmed funding commitments for tagging work in PNG:

- 6. Summary of Overall Project Progress:

Project implementation has achieved a level of uniformity and the roll-out of activities is consistent with the approved annual work plan and budget. The exception to this is the activities relating to benthic biodiversity survey and the analysis of data collected on seamounts collected through tagging and trophic sampling. IUCN have proposed a number of options for ways in which the delay in the work involved can be progressed. Their report is to be considered by the Regional Steering Committee in October.

Increasingly, efforts to identify and secure co-financing for activities described in the project are occurring. SPC has to-date reported co-financing from a number of externalities to the project for activities relating to tagging and trophic structure investigations. These sources include, but are not limited to PNG, New Zealand AID, French Pacific Fund, Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research and the University of Hawaii, with proposals under consideration from the EU and the US State Department. Discussions also took place with the Japanese Government and the Secretariat for the WCPF Commission to look at ways in which USD2m of trust fund contributions can be attributed to assisting developing member of the WCPF Commission in the areas of data collection and regulation and enforcement.

As the work of the WCPF Commission picks up momentum, the project provides every possible opportunity within its framework to assist Pacific SIDS met their obligations. The challenges before them can not be underestimated. Two regular sessions of the WCPF Committee have taken place, the second of which endorsed a series of management and conservation measures and resolutions relating to seabirds and circle hooks, sharks, overcapcity, non-target fish species, turtles, authorisation to fish, identification of fishing vessels, measures in relation to bigeye and yellowfin tuna, albacore and northern Pacific albacore. Two regular sessions of the Technical and Compliance Committee have met, the most recent being 28 September. Two regular session of the Science Committee have also met the last as recently as August this year and within the time frame of this quarterly report. Note that 711 – 59% - of the potential seamounts were in fact misidentified atolls, or islands. All the data is stored in a database and a report on this work is in preparation.
	A research consultant was appointed in July for a 6 month period to examine satellite oceanographic data (sea surface temperature, chlorophyll and sea surface height) in relation to seamounts. Public domain SST and chlorophyll data are available via a web-based interface, allowing visualization and analysis at monthly intervals with a spatial resolution of 9 km x 9km. The first part of the project involved the investigation of correlations between time series of chlorophyll and SST. The analyses use a specific sampling scheme around certain shallow seamounts to see if there is any variability indicative of seamount associated oceanographic features. The preliminary results show more variability in chlorophyll levels than is apparent for SST; whether this is a localised seamount effect or a product of phytoplankton patchiness that also occurs in ocean areas will be investigated. A second approach is to use GIS software to identify with greater precision those areas around seamounts with high levels of chlorophyll, during those months of the year where chlorophyll concentration is highest, for the area between PNG and New Caledonia. Sea surface temperature and Sea Level Anomaly may also be studied using the same method.

6. Summary of Overall Project Progress:

This project report covers the last quarter of 2007, the end of which represents 15 months of project operations. Project implementation continues to maintain a level of uniformity and the roll-out of activities is consistent with the approved annual work plan and budget. The exception to this remains the activities relating to benthic biodiversity survey, the analysis of data on seamounts collected through tagging and trophic sampling and the policy work that would involve from the science. The delay in this area of the project was considered by the second regional Steering Committee meeting which met at Nadi, Fiji in October. The Committee agreed to allow IUCN to determine which of the options presented the best way forward for this work was. IUCN expects to make a decision by 28 February 2007.

In terms of co-financing, the exchange of correspondence with the Japanese Government and the WCPF Commission Secretariat concerning the application of USD2m of trust fund to assist developing members of the WCPF Commission in the areas of data collection and regulation and enforcement continued.

The WCPFC meeting agenda in the later part of 2006 remains burdensome for small Pacific Island fisheries administrations. Cumulating in the third session of the WCPFC Commission in December 2006, the preceding WCPFC meetings included a second session of the Commission Science Committee in August, and a second session of the Technical and Compliance Committee at Brisbane in October. All Commission meeting outcomes are available at the Commission website http://www.wcpfc.org/

Project coordination and management continues to operate with both achievements and challenges. The successful conclusion of the second Regional Steering Committee despite the need to change venues last minute due to political unrest in Honiara can be counted positively. The meeting did highlight however the need to promote project activities at national level and the weakness in communication between the Implementing Agency and the PCU, particularly concerning financial matters. The presence of an IUCN representative at RSC2 would have been beneficial and with the establishment of an office in Suva, Fiji is anticipated that IUCN will have a physical presence at future Committee meetings.

Professionals at SPC-OFP charged with implementation of component one comment that "The administration demands of this project, in particular the need for monthly financial reporting, on SPC-OFP resources continue to be high and insufficiently resourced by the project." This is a view that is shared by the PCU. The suggestions to provide monthly financial reports are inefficient and impact on the delivery of other project activities.

8. Challenges/Issues Encountered

General comment – Targets for research work of benthic communities on seamounts in the Pacific are not being met due to reasons beyond the control of IUCN. SPC provides comment and suggestion below on a further option for the application of unspent research allocations. This problem is also applicable to the related policy work that IUCN expected to complete under component two in conjunction with the FFA. IUCN are expected to advise the status of the work on 28 February 2007.

SPC - One issue encountered concerns Activity 1.3.2.2: Describe Seamounts and analyse historical fishing patterns around seamounts. This work, particularly the description of seamounts, has proved more technically challenging than had been envisaged during the project planning. While much progress has been made, it is clear that additional resources could usefully be reallocated to this activity to allow a full analysis of fishing patterns in relation to identified seamounts, and to analyse the impact of seamounts on various oceanographic and biological productivity parameters.

FFA – Collaboration on policy advice for management options on high seas areas and seamounts at national and regional levels and the establishment of MPAs is being explored to address IUCN work programme difficulties.

9. Solutions Applied (to address issues and challenges)

SPC - A suggested solution to the above problem is the application of unused funds initially allocated to IUCN to support various activities associated with the oceanographic cruise, which now looks likely to be cancelled.

FFA – Commenced discussions with IUCN on policy work.

10. Recommendations for Future Action

Consideration be given to reallocation of IUCN research related funds and possibly those in Component Two.

6. Summary of Overall Project Progress:

This project report covers the first quarter of 2007, the end of which represents **18** months of project operations. Project implementation continues to maintain a level of uniformity and the roll-out of activities is largely consistent with the approved annual work plan and budget. The exception to this remains the activities relating to benthic biodiversity survey, the analysis of data on seamounts collected through tagging and trophic sampling and the policy work that would involve from the science. The delay in this area of the project was considered by the second regional Steering Committee meeting which met at Nadi, Fiji in October. IUCN was expected to determine which of the options by 28 February 2007 but have further requested a deferment with which to report. Both the SPC and FFA have provided suggestions for the use of additional funds for activities consistent with the original intent by IUCN.

Project coordination and management continues to operate with both achievements and challenges. Negotiations for a comprehensive international standard audit for 2006 project expenditure commenced in late 2006 in preparation for an early as possible commencement in 2007.

8. Challenges/Issues Encountered

- IUCN have further deferred (due 28 February) reporting on the way in which they intend to progress project outputs for collection and analysis of information on seamounts in the WTP LME and identification of possible management options for seamounts, including compliance options.
- ii) One issue encountered concerns Activity 1.3.2.2: Describe Seamounts and analyse historical fishing patterns around seamounts. This work, particularly the description of seamounts, has proved more technically challenging than had been envisaged during the project planning. While much progress has been made, it is clear that additional resources could usefully be reallocated to this activity to allow a full analysis of fishing patterns in relation to identified seamounts, and to analyse the impact of seamounts on various oceanographic and biological productivity parameters.
- iii) Activity 1.2.3.2: Attach national technical staff to SPC/OFP this is becoming increasingly difficult to organise due to the increasing and competing domestic commitments and travel commitments of suitably qualified fisheries staff from national fisheries departments and authorities.
- iv) A series of Policy and Legal Reform work scheduled to take place in Tonga has been disrupted by the outbreak of civil unrest in the Kingdom. This work has been deferred.
- A major Compliance strengthening sub-component consultancy to develop a draft Regional MCS Strategy has stalled with the departure of the Manager of the MCS Division at FFA.
- vi) National country visits continue to highlight the low level of understanding of the PI OFM Project at national fisheries administration and the progress of national needs identified during the development of the project document. General project overview presentations continue to be made. National Focal Points also continue to be unable to distinguish project funded activities within the work programmes of the FFA & SPC.

9. Solutions Applied (to address issues and challenges)

- i) IUCN have advise they will provide an update in due course;
- ii) A suggested solution to the above problem is the application of unused funds initially allocated to IUCN to support various activities associated with the oceanographic cruise, which now looks likely to be cancelled.
- iii) Attachments are still being planned and undertaken by SPC whenever possible to complement stock assessment training and NTFSR work.
- iv) Work has been rescheduled to the third quarter of 2007 (early July)
- v) Interim MCS Manager to advise progress.
- vi) Project country visits provide overview, work with fisheries administrations to update needs and assessments and develop national annual work plans. Particular attention is focused on national level activities. A basic project pamphlet has been produced and will be distributed widely. A series of fliers are planned on various project activities and Commission issues are to be produced. Website continues to be updated.

This project report covers the second quarter of 2007. 8. Challenges/Issues Encountered

Activity 2.3.1.2 and 2.3.1.3: It has been difficult to plan reviews and conduct National Institutional Reform Workshops with identified and likely candidate national fisheries departments and authorities. This is due to their identification and subsequent focus on other national priorities (much of them related to obligations under the WCPFC) and the increasing and competing domestic commitments and travel commitments of their experienced staff. There also has become a need to closely align work in this area with the Australian funded Pacific Governance and Strengthening Project and prioritised work in this area by AusAID. As a result the work identified for Quarters 3 and 4 will likely be initiated though not with full expenditure of funds and completed as anticipated.

9. Solutions Applied (to address issues and challenges)

The FFA will continue to consult with identified and likely candidate recipient national fisheries departments and authorities in this regard and will liaise and coordinate such work closely with other interested donor agencies.

- 6. Summary of Overall Project Progress:

The fourth quarter of 2007 saw the project complete twenty seven months of activities under the guidance of the Oceanic Fisheries Programme at SPC and the FFA. During this period the third meeting of the Regional Steering Committee for the project successfully convened in Rarotonga in October at which project progress and challenges were reported. Project awareness and project activities expected to be progressed by the IUCN remain challenges, although assurances have been made that matters will be decided by the close of 2007 by IUCN. Impacting greatly on the work of the project is the number of fisheries events and meetings in the region and the burden of keeping abreast with the weight of obligations by small and poorly resources Pacific islands fisheries administrations and other government departments involved in regional fisheries issues.

Considerable progress has been achieved with the roll out and improvement of the TUFMANs database by SPC and the support towards helping build the capacity of Pacific fisheries administrations in stock assessment and their scientific reporting obligations to the Commission. Equally, those project activities that are guided by the FFA in the Policy Component of the project continue to be invaluable for the preparations required by Pacific islands countries to allow them to participate effectively in the work of the Commission. The outcomes of the most recent Commission meeting in December at Guam failed to adopted some much needed conservation measures to address widely held concerns for the bigeye and yellowfin stocks in the region. This remains a disappointment but Pacific islands members of the Commission are resolute in their efforts to be responsible fisheries managers and anticipate that in 2008 they will need to be instrumental in finding solutions for impasse at the Commission.
